Dear families,

On behalf of the whole staff, I want to express how joyous an experience it was to welcome the first cohort of students back to school on Monday. We dressed in sparkles to show our excitement! By 9.15, students had reconnected with friends and were settled in their classrooms, including the group of Yrs 3 – 6 continuing online learning students who had been attending Safe and Supervised Sites. At the end of the first day, staff reflected on how fresh and engaged the students were. We agreed it was a lovely day for everyone! We are full of admiration for parents who, through difficult times, have kept children safe and participating in learning to the degree you were able in your own family context. We hope it hasn't been too much of a wrench to deliver them back into our care.

The system-wide, phased return to school means that some students are learning at school while others are awaiting their return date. Festa della Repubblica Italiana – Italian National Day

Dear Parents and Readers

This week I have been corresponding with Anna Rita Tamponi, the Director of Educational and Cultural Office at the Embassy of Italy, regarding Yarralumla's annual celebration of Italy's Festa della Repubblica. Traditionally, at Yarralumla we have an assembly in the hall on the morning of 2 June and the Ambassador, or another dignitary from the Embassy of Italy, addresses the children and school community. They share the history and significance of this important national day of celebration.

Unfortunately, the impact of Covid-19 has had a dreadful toll on the citizens of Italy, with an enormous number of deaths. Consequently, the Italian Government has decided to cancel all celebrations this year.

However, the Ambassador, Ms Francesca Tardioli, has graciously offered to write an official message to the children at Yarralumla, which we will read and translate for the children on 2 June. The Ambassador has congratulated us on the initiative to commemorate this important day.

This day of commemoration coincides with all students returning to school on 2 June. Our request is for all children to be in their green, white and red school uniform. Staff will also dress in Italy's national colours. At the moment, we are brainstorming ways of demonstrating our support for the citizens of Italy along the lines of the English clapping in support of their frontline workers. This demonstration of support is to be decided.

Yarralumla Primary School sends sincere condolences to our Italian families and community for the loss of loved ones and those who are still suffering as a direct result of the COVID-19 virus.

Maestra Lynden and the Yarralumla School Community



My name is Rosalie, and I'm the school psychologist at Yarralumla Primary School. My job is to support the school in giving our students the best possible outcomes for learning and wellbeing. I do this through work with individual students – completing activities which can tell us about our strengths and areas of difficulty. It is part of my job to make sure that students are able to receive supports (where needed) in their classrooms.

I also work together with families and students to find ways to improve health and wellbeing. If you are interested in speaking with me, please talk to your class teacher. That way, we can decide on the most helpful way forward.

Some things about me:

What do I enjoy about being a school psychologist:

I have worked across many settings during the past 6 years in my field. I really enjoy the sense of community and connectedness that comes with working in a school. I love seeing our teachers do their work, as it is clear to me that they have such a determined desire for their students to succeed. I enjoy hearing the laughter coming from the playground during breaks (I'm certainly looking forward to this when the students are back on the grounds).

What have I noticed that is unique to working at Yarralumla Primary School:

Most school psychologists work across more than one school. I have noticed that Yarralumla Primary School has the best view of the Black Mountain (Telstra) Tower (which I can see from my office). We have a beautiful, rich environment, which is highlighted when the leaves turn amber and brown during Autumn. We have passionate staff, and wellbeing is at the forefront of the work that we do at the school.

How do I know when my work is successful:

As a school psychologist, I wear many 'hats'. Sometimes I'm supporting students one on one, sometimes I'm supporting parents and families, sometimes I am supporting staff and classrooms, and other times I'm making sure that my notes and disability applications are correct, up to date, and in line with the ethics of my profession. A successful day for me is when I can make time for the people that I'm working with. I feel best when I have gone beyond simply 'finding out'. With the many families that I work with, and the different parts of my role, it can be a bit of a juggle.

All in all, I feel very excited to be a part of the Yarralumla community.

At this time, we can all play a role in supporting those around us. Making sure that we take the time to check in with others, really hear what they have to say, and finding out what they might need. It will take a community effort to mend from our recent challenges, and I look forward to being a part of this.

Enrolments 2021

Enrolling in Preschool in 2021

If your child turns four on or before 30 April 2020, they were able to start preschool in Term 1, 2020. **If your child turns four after 30 April 2020, they can start preschool in 2021**

All four year old ACT children are guaranteed a place in a public preschool. However, you are not guaranteed a place at the preschool site of your preference, due to capacity constraints at some sites. All preschools offer a high-quality early childhood education.

There were some other matters that were discussed during the last P&C meeting in December 2019 regarding school uniforms, class splitting, fundraising etc. that are still on our agenda for further action. As soon as school settles back into a routine, we will plan a P&C meeting, respectfully before the end of this term. In the meantime, I will do my best to keep everyone connected and updated wherever possible.

Library information

Accessing our School Library and Home Readers

Due to social distancing requirements, the library will remain closed to families before and after school until further notice. Students will be able to borrow books to take home during their class sessions from next week. Teachers will continue to support students to borrow books to bring home and will continue to have mini libraries for students to read in class. Students may also continue to borrow home readers, and these can be swapped at the front office.

All library books and home readers need to be returned to the box located new the front office. These books will be quarantined for 24 hours before being cleaned and ready for borrowing again. We currently have over 1000 overdue books so now is a great time to have a hunt at home and bring in your library books to swap when your child returns to school.

Our online library collection is still available for all families to access at any time from home using a device. There are thousands of eBooks, audiobooks and magazines to browse through. To access the online library using the SORA application or website, follow these steps:

Getting started with Sora

With Sora, you can borrow free e-books and audiobooks from the central **ACT Education Directorate** collection. More than 7,000 e-book titles and 1,000 audiobooks available for recreational reading. Borrow up to 10 resources at a time! Loan period is four weeks with an early-return option for those quick, enthusiastic readers. Need a bit more time, then use the renewal option if no one has placed a HOLD (reserve).

Step 1

Go online to soraapp.com. or install the free Sora app from the [Apple App Store](#) or [Google Play Store](#)

Step 2

In Sora, in **Find My School** enter the set-up code **ACT Education Directorate (NOT the individual school name)**, then, sign in using your school, individual login credentials, ie. student ID number (just the number not full email address) and password for students and staff account (firstname_surname) and password for teachers.

Step 3



Browse the **Explore** tab and borrow an e-book or audiobook. Your book will open so you can start reading or listening right away.

Step 4



Close the book and go to **Shelf** & see all your books (up to 10!). From there you can:

- Select **Open book** or **Open audiobook** to read or listen to the book.
- Select **Options** to renew or return the book.

National Reconciliation Week 27 May – 3 June

This year's theme - In This Together

In 2020 Reconciliation Australia marks twenty years of shaping Australia's journey towards a more just, equitable and reconciled nation.

Much has happened since the early days of the people's movement for reconciliation, including greater acknowledgement of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander rights to land and sea; understanding of the impact of government policies and frontier conflicts; and an embracing of stories of Indigenous success and contribution.

2020 also marks the twentieth anniversary of the reconciliation walks of 2000, when people came together to walk on bridges and roads across the nation and show their support for a more reconciled Australia.

As always, we stand on the shoulders of those who came before us, and Australians now benefit from the efforts and contributions of people committed to reconciliation in the past.

On this journey, Australians are all **In This Together**; every one of us has a role to play when it comes to reconciliation, and in playing our part we collectively build relationships and communities that value Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, histories and cultures.

What is National Reconciliation Week?

National Reconciliation Week (NRW) is a time for all Australians to learn about our shared histories, cultures, and achievements, and to explore how each of us can contribute to achieving reconciliation in Australia.

The dates for NRW remain the same each year; 27 May to 3 June. These dates commemorate two significant milestones in the reconciliation journey—the successful 1967 referendum, and the High Court Mabo decision respectively.

Reconciliation must live in the hearts, minds and actions of all Australians as we move forward, creating a nation strengthened by respectful relationships between the wider Australian community, and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

Healthy Kids Association is pleased to be reopening the school canteen on Friday 5th June.


The canteen service will still operate Fridays with online ordering for lunch only.
